MINUTES OF THE LITTLE CALUMET RIVER BASIN DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION HELD ON THURSDAY, APRIL 30, 1987 AT THE COMMISSION OFFICES 8149 KENNEDY AVENUE, HIGHLAND, INDIANA

The meeting was called to order at 7:10 p.m. by Chairman Michael Doyne. Nine Commissioners were present. Guests were recognized and quorum was declared.

A motion to approve the minutes of the April 7th, 1987 meeting was made by Clyde Baughard; seconded by John DeMeo; motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Mike Doyne introduced Col. Finch who gave a presentation on the Little Calumet River Project implementation. He stated that the Corps has been proceeding with limited planning & design on the western reach. Work will proceed this summer on the eastern reach. The President's fiscal budget for 1988 contains \$250,000 to be used to complete general design memorandum and initiate design of the first construction features of the project. He stated that the controversy over the authorized plan versus the Corps recommended plan is nearing resolution. Attempts are being made to find cost cutting measures for the authorized plan while at the same time keeping the level of protection authorized.

Finance/Policy Committee - Treasurer Doyle Niemeyer presented the financial status sheet for April. Treasurer Niemeyer made a motion to approve the claims for April as presented with one additional claim for \$60.00 for Maruszczak's; seconded by Clyde Baughard; motion passed unanimously.

<u>Legislative Committee</u> - Committee Chairman George Carlson reported that the Oxbow area has been traded between the city of Hammond and the town of Highland.

Dan Gardner added that the Governor has called for a special session for the General Assembly to resolve several issues, one being the monies requested for the Lake Michigan Marina Development Commission. The \$2 million is remaining in the budget for the Little Calumet River Basin Development Commission.

Land Acquisition/Management Committee - Committee Chairman Chuck Agnew made a motion to purchase snow fencing and posts at a cost of \$537 to construct on marina site in Portage to keep sand from blowing. The city of Portage had received complaints of blowing sand. Constructing snow fencing was the most reasonable way of alleviating the problem. The motion was seconded by Clyde Baughard; motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Agnew reported that a bid opening was held this morning on leasing the 113.8 acre farm land, DC83. One bid was received from Jeff Ewen for \$770.50 an acre. Mr. Agnew made a motion to accept the bid and lease the land to Mr. Ewen for one year only; motion seconded by Clyde Baughard; motion passed unanimously. Farm land was properly advertised and bid was properly prepared.

Elaine Chandler and Nancy Christoph from Lake County Parks Dept. gave a presentation to the Commission on a plan to develop the recently acquired Cat Fish Bay area. After presenting a map and a description of suggested improvements, the Commission voted to accept only some of the improvements presented. The Commission did not feel a parking lot could be funded at this time. Bill Tanke made a motion that landscaping of evergreen and decidious tree buffer along perimeter of property regrading of Catfish Bay banks on north and south sides 200 1.f. to a 3:1 slope be funded at this time. The motion was seconded by George Carlson. The motion was then amended to also fund the purchase of a guardrail between the existing gravel road Catfish Bay pond. Motion passed unanimously. suggested that the price of a wood guardrail over a metal one be investigated. Funding of these three items total \$7,640.

Chuck Agnew made a motion that the Cat Fish Bay plan be conceptually accepted by the Commission; motion seconded by Clyde Baughard; motion passed unanimously.

Interium Flood Control Planning Committee - Committee Chairman Arlene Colvin stated that the Indianapolis Blvd. bridge area river work has been completed. The levees have been graded, compacted and seeded. Army Corps of Engineers have inspected the area and found it acceptable. She distributed specifications prepared by Ten Ech for the rip-rap project and the specifications for river clearing from Indianapolis to Kennedy. Permits for this project are now being applied for.

She added that a complaint from a resident in the Black Oak area was received in regard to obstructions at the Chase Street culvert. Cleaning of that culvert falls in the jurisdiction of the city of Gary. Ms. Colvin contacted Gary General Services to perform this work as soon as possible.

Dan Gardner stated that the Little Calumet River Basin Commission met last week and discussion took place regarding the Penn Central Railroad culverts. The Basin Commission has authorized Ten Ech Engineering to pursue modeling to allow permit issuance. They will also look at the channel all the way to Deep River. Any work that would be performed would be compatible with the long range plan.

George Carlson stated that there is some \$19,000 in the city of Hammond's Community Block Grant budget that may be used to remove some of the pilings from under the Erie bridge at Indianapolis Blvd. Removal of some of the pilings would improve the water flow in that area.

Breakwater/Marina Committee - Committee Chairman Bill Tanke reported that the budget passed with \$4 million appropriated to the Lake Michigan Marina Development Commission to be divided among the five cities. \$8.6 million is to be appropriated as a loan to the Marina Commission.

Mr. Tanke reported that appraisals on the 14 NIPSCO lots needed for the marina site are being made.

The handrails on the breakwaters are in place.

Mr. Gardner added that the boat excise tax bill did not pass this session. The bill was very complicated and there seemed to be many misunderstandings about it.

Richard Bundy, Salmon Unlimited, questioned the quality of the rip rap to be used for placement on the banks at Indianapolis Blvd. bridge. He also commended on the pumping of water into the river by the southeast pump station in Hammond.

Bob Frum from Lefty's Coho questioned whether a final site had been determined for the marina and whether or not a traffic impact study had been made. He was informed that several parcels of property have been purchased to date for a site and the remainder of the needed property is in the process of being acquired. Mr. Gardner stated the site was chosen through a master plan study and was submitted to the Army Corps of Engineers.

The next meeting was scheduled for 6:30 p.m. Thursday, May 28, 1987.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned 8:00 p.m.

HOUSE ENROLLED ACT No. 1700

AN ACT concerning appropriations and administration of funds.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. (a) The following definitions apply

throughout this act:

- (1) "Personal services" includes payments for salaries and wages to officers and employees of the state (either regular or temporary), payments for compensation awards, special payments for expert service, and the employer's share of social security, health insurance, life insurance and retirement fund contributions.
- (2) "Other operating expense" includes payments for "services other than personal", "services by contract", "supplies, materials, and parts", "grants, subsidies, refunds, and awards", "in-state travel", "out-of-state travel", and "equipment", unless equipment is included as a separate line item.
- (3) "Equipment" includes payments for machinery, implements, tools, furniture, furnishings, vehicles, and other articles that have a calculable period of service for more than twelve (12) calendar months.
- (4) "Total operating expense" includes payments for both "personal services" and "other operating expense".
- (5) "Pension fund contributions" means the State of Indiana's contribution to a specific retirement fund.
- (6) "Deficiency appropriation" or "special claim" means an appropriation available during the 1986-87 fiscal year.
- (7) "Fee replacement" or "interim financing" includes repayment on indebtedness resulting from financing the cost of planning, purchasing, rehabilitation, construction, repair, leasing, lease-purchasing, or otherwise acquiring land,

Dear Representative Rogers:

On behalf of the board members of the Little Calumet River Basin Development Commission, I wish to thank you for your support for continued State funding for the Little Calumet River Project. The \$2 million in this biennium will continue a strong State commitment toward the ultimate elimination of flooding along the river, and the reclamation of this a useful recreational resource. continued efforts are vital to this success and are much appreciated.

As we stated in testimony to the Budget Committee the session's beginning, the recent Federal construction authorization by Congress, signed into law by President Reagan on November 17, 1986, signals the end of planning and the go-ahead for Federal construction. been in close contact with the Corps of We have Engineers offices to support as early a construction start as is possible. Presently, preliminary engineerhas begun leading to construction plans specifications. Most optimistic scheduling anticipates a 1990 construction start of the overall project. The first construction item will be levees in the Gary stretch of the river - an area that is unprotected today.

In our budget request presentation, we emphasized that the construction start greatly accelerates the need for available State funding allow Federal to contract letting. Our ability to meet non-Federal funding obligations outlined a scenario of needing \$10 million of additional funding over three bienniums to avoid project construction delays. The \$2 million

appropriated this biennium is a step in the right direction - but the succeeding steps are equally as important. Your continued interest and active support for this project through construction is important to its ultimate success.

In the interium, the Development Commission is continuing project land acquisition; meeting with effected cities/towns to provide information and anticipate construction; and is working with the lake County Drainage Board and Little Calumet River Basin Commission on interium flood relief projects. All efforts are geared toward eliminating river blockages and reducing needed State funding to accomplish the non-Federal items of commitment.

We will keep you periodically informed of major milestones in the project engineering and will schedule a combined Federal/State legislators briefing prior to the next General Assembly session to provide a comprehensive status report and accounting of State appropriations expenditures. We welcome any questions you may have, and I would be happy to meet with you to more fully brief you if you desire.

Again, thank you for your efforts in this year's legislative session.

Dear Col. Finch:

Thank you for your letter of April 10, 1987 regarding the Little Calumet River project in northern Indiana. However, your letter gives me the feeling that there may be some misunderstanding of Indiana's position regarding the project which I will attempt to clarify.

Maximum flood protection in Indiana never was the primary reason supporting Indiana's position that the Little Calumet Project be planned without the SCS Thornton Reservoir. After many frustrating years of project planning with the Corps of Engineers, a plan was chosen which would reduce the local sponsors down to a minimum number. We have never opposed the SCS Thornton Reservoir and have openly supported it. The implementation of the Thornton Reservoir would mean the removal of the state line floodwall and a reduction in levee heights. (This was based upon the assumption that the level of protection would be the same with or without the Thornton Reservoir, but the flood stage would be higher without the reservoir.) We did not want Indiana's project conditioned on an action over which we had no control.

This is the first time that your Chicagoland Underflow Plan was used as a reason for including the Thornton Reservoir in the planning of the Little Calumet project in Indiana. Your letter of May 30, 1986 listed three reasons why the Thornton Reservoir assumption was made and the above reason was not one of them.

I fail to understand why the documentation of the rating curve at the state line must wait on guidance from the Office, Chief of Engineers. The rating curve represents existing conditions and needs to be established regardless of the plan to be implemented. As we stated before, Table No. 7 appears to more closely represent an acceptable rating. But, before Indiana accepts the rating curve, we want to know how it was developed.

In closing let me again repeat that it is Indiana's desire that the Little Calumet River Project progress to the construction phase as quickly as possible. The project that I refer to is the one authorized by the Congress of the United States and signed and approved by the President of the United States.



GARY — Across most of Northwest Indiana, the flood waters receded. A lot of poople think Black Oak is where it all wound up. There was water, water every-where Tuesdey in the Black Oak and Small Farms areas of



Flooding of streets has always been a problem after rain, Nichols said, but it usually drains or evaporates within a few hours. Nichols said she hadn't seen water as deep in the area since the late 1950s.


wasn't draining.
Near 25th Avenue and Durbin
Street, Jo Ann Weidemann, 32,
waded through knee-high water
to announce: "Two rooms in my

house are under water."
Weidemann said she woke at 5 a.m to the sound of water rushing through a portion of the house. Water was waist-high in the backyard.

"I tried to vacuum it up," said Weidemann, "but you throw it out and it just comes back. I don't know what we're going to do to get rid of it. It's going to be two months before I can mow my lawn."

Most lawns near Weldemann's house were also submerged and water was standing at the front

doors of many.
"You know what we need," said Weidemann. "What we need is a whole bunch of circus elephants out here. They each drink 30 gallons of water a day. We'd be rid of this water in no time."

At the May 12 Marina Committee meeting, it was decided by the Committee that with the expiration of L. Frum's lease for boat slips (lease valid until March 1987) we needed to inform Mr. Frum of our intentions not to renew the lease.

Also after discussion, it was decided to "put on notice" the Marquette Boat Club and again Mr. Frum that payment for use of slips situated on lots given to the Development Commission by the Porter County Commissioners would need to be paid for the 1987 boating season. The current Frum lease averages \$175/slip per year. An appraisal could be performed to determine the validity of this price. Only one year would be discussed.

This notification would also have the added advantage of "smoking out" any remaining legal challenges by Frum to our ownership of the lots previously held by the Porter County Commissioners.

Please call me if you have any questions. Our intent in this memo is to brief all board members of the issues and to resolve any questions before the public meeting and eliminate the need for extensive public debate/discussion over the issues.


