MINUTES OF THE LITTLE CALUMET RIVER BASIN DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION HELD AT 6:30 P.M. THURSDAY, DECEMBER 5, 1991 AT THE COMMISSION OFFICES 8149 KENNEDY AVENUE, HIGHLAND, INDIANA

Chairperson Arlene Colvin called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Nine (9) Commissioners were present. Quorum was declared and guests were recognized.

The minutes of the November 7th, 1991 meeting were approved by a motion from Clyde Baughard; seconded by Dave Springman; motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Arlene Colvin selected a Nominating Committee to present a slate of officers for 1992 at the January meeting. She appointed Dave Springman, Nathanial Leonard and Chuck Agnew, with Mr. Agnew acting as Chairman of the Nominating Committee.

Mr. Gardner gave a report on the groundbreaking ceremony that was held on November 8th at north Gleason Park off Broadway in Gary. The Groundbreaking kicked off the first phase construction of the Federal flood control project between Harrison and Broadway. The ceremony was very well attended with about 80 people.

Construction of the first phase segment is being performed by Dyer Construction.

Mr. Gardner informed the Commission that he gave a presentation to the Gary city council members arranged by Arlene Colvin. He and Arlene brought them up to date on the project and what work will be done in Gary so they would have a clearer understanding of the project. He stated he would do periodic updates to keep them informed. One concern they had was bridge coordination on Grant Street. Mr. Gardner stated a highway meeting will be set up early in January to discuss bridge coordination.

Finance/Policy Committee - Treasurer Clyde Baughard presented the financial status report for November as well as the claims. Mr. Baughard made a motion to approve the pending claims; motion seconded by John DeMeo; motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Baughard presented the 1992 budget. He noted the only change in the new budget was an increase in the Utility Relocation Costs line increasing it from \$100,000 to \$200,000. This was done in anticipation of increased costs relocating utility lines as outlined in the Corps project estimates.

Mr. Baughard presented the NIRPC contract for administrative services for 1992. Changes included (1) monthly salary reimbursements to be \$5,250 instead of \$5,000 to reflect 1992 salary increase for Dan Gardner and Sandy Mordus; (2) accounting charge will be increased to \$300 from \$100 per month; (3) copying machine charge will increase from 5 cents to 7 cents per copy; and (4) room charge will be \$150 per month for each additional space occupied with Bruce Stouffer's room rate increasing to \$235 from \$225 per month. Mr. Baughard made a motion to approve the 1992 contract with the Regional Planning Commission; motion seconded by Chuck Agnew; motion passed unanimously. It was discussed and directed that the administrative contract be made available to all Commissioners prior to vote next year to allow for their review.

Land Acquisition/Management Committee - Committee Chairman Chuck Agnew gave the land acquisition report. Mr. Agnew made a motion authorizing condemnation proceedings on three properties: DC114, DC120 and DC121; motion seconded by George Carlson; motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Agnew made a motion to approve the low bidder (Nimetz Trucking) on a demolition contract for 3302 Colfax; motion seconded by John DeMeo; motion passed unanimously. He stated that demolition proposals went out to nine companies - only three responded. They were:

Nimetz Trucking \$3,740 Henderson & Son \$4,728 Reagins Demolition \$6,500

Mike Kerr from TPA requested a contract extension of one month for up to the amount of \$5,508 to allow for continued oversee of the Conrail culvert enlargement project at Martin Luther King Drive. The original contract was for one month; the extension would add one additional month. He previously met with the Land Acquisition committee to explain the request. The project is a unique one that requires engineering monitoring. Mr. Agnew made a motion to extend the contract for an additional month; motion seconded by John DeMeo; motion passed unanimously. Mike Kerr distributed some pictures taken at the project site. He will have slides available at the next meeting.

Interim Flood Committee - Committee Chairman Clyde Baughard reported that the dredging project at Indianapolis Blvd. is proceeding. That work is being funded by the town of Highland, the city of Hammond and SEMA.

Marina/Breakwater Committee - Committee Chairman Bill Tanke reported that the Commission received 4 proposals for a consultant to prepare an engineering/financial analysis plan for the Portage public marina. The four proposals were:

The Abonmarche Group \$22,750
Crowe Chizek-Johnson, Johnson & Roy \$75,000
TPA \$40,000
McDonough Associates \$70,000

Mr. Tanke made a motion to award a contract as advertised to Abonmarche subject to final agreement with NIPSCO on their right-of-way and surplus lots; motion seconded by John DeMeo; motion passed unanimously. A letter is forthcoming from NIPSCO stating current technical design guidelines. The surplus NIPSCO lots are currently being appraised (cost to be split between NIPSCO and Commission).

There was no other business. No statements from the floor. Due to the Wednesday January 1 holiday, the next Commission meeting was scheduled for Wednesday, January 8th.

Dear Mr. Gardner:

Enclosed are two sets of copies of the Memorandum of Agreement and the Escrow Agreement for the design of the betterments that the Commission is contemplating. One set indicates the changes from the first draft submitted to you including the changes that you and Mr. Casale had requested. These changes have been indicated by striking through any deletions and underlining any additions to the agreement language. The second set are clean copies, ready for execution by the Commission.

As Mr. Paul Benkowski indicated to you in his August 7, 1991 letter, the Escrow Agreement may be subject to approval by our Washington headquarters. If the revised Escrow Agreement is acceptable to you and the bank, please advise so we can initiate the approval process. The Escrow Agreement should not be signed until approval is obtained. You can anticipate the Escrow approval process, if required, to take several months.

Paragraph 3 of the Memorandum of Agreement now provides for a commitment ceiling on design costs of \$468,000. The new ceiling projects a 5 percent annual escalation of costs. In uninflated 1991 dollars, we anticipate spending \$137,000.00 in fiscal 1993 and \$281,000.00 in fiscal 1994.

Enclosed are five copies of the Memorandum of Agreement for execution. A copy of the Commission's resolution evidencing the signatory authority to enter into this agreement should be attached to the agreement.

Little Cal dredging may be finished soon

HIGHLAND - Dredging on the Little Calumet River near the Wicker Park Manor subdivision, a two-week job that was supposed to be finished by mid-October, may not be done until this weekend.

The subdivision of approximately 275 homes was devastated by a flood slightly more than a year ago when water poured over a nearby embankment.

The embankment had been lowered when a nearby firm enlarged its parking lot.

Dredging is expected to improve the flow of water and diminish chances for future floods.

Crews are dredging 700 feet of the river: 350 feet east of Indianapolis Boulevard and 350 west of it.

Mike Vander Heyden, president of the Dyer Construction Co. of Dyer, said Monday dredging is complete except for an area west of Indianapolis Boulevard.

Vander Heyden expects the work will take another two days. Crews will not work on Christmas Eve or Christmas, he said, but will resume work Thursday with a Saturday completion forecast.

The first delay in the work came when town officials discovered they needed a permit from a federal agency before the river could be dredged.

Once the permit was secured, work began, but the weather turned rainy, causing another delay.

The job will cost \$43,450. Three-fourths of the money will come from the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

The remaining 25 percent of the cost will be split between Highland and the city of Hammond, which borders the river on the north.

The Company will attempt to accommodate any suitable use of our property through negotiations of a license agreement meeting our mutual needs.

In response to our last meeting with the City of Portage, we have reviewed the site plan and have proposed the basic design criteria for the use of our property.

Electric Design: It is our understanding that the area within our transmission right-of-way will be used primarily for parking and roadways. We have enclosed a copy of a drawing showing the areas we would need access to outlined in yellow. Generally, this area should be clear of obstructions and graded to no more than a 10:1 slope. Unshaded areas on NIPSCO right-of-way could have up to a 5:1 slope. Please note that an additional proposed 69 ky pole line is indicated on the print provided.

Gas Design: Our basic concern is to maintain three feet of cover over the line and retain enough room to allow access for any future maintenance of the line. To accomplish this we feel we must have three feet of cover over the center of the line and maintain this same level for one rod (16 1/2 feet) either side of the centerline. Beyond this distance of one rod from centerline we must insure that the slope will not cause erosion into our one rod level space. We feel that any slope steeper than 3-1 should be protected by either a retaining wall, terracing, or rip-rap to prevent erosion.

Low growing shrubs or bushes could be planted on the right-of way in such a way that it would not interfere with the maintenance of our lines and no permanent buildings would be allowed.

We would be pleased to work with the Commissioner in developing this project.

City marina groundbreaking targeted

Pertage could begin breaking ground on its public marina by spring 1993, approunced city engineer John Hannon at the Portage Port Authority's Nov. 21 meeting.

Hannon, however, projects a \$2 million short. fall in funding the \$7 million project. But he believes the city and its marina partner, the Little Calumet River Basin Development Coministion, have the leverage to get more money out of the state.

If the public marina isn't built, the state will have to reimburse the federal government. \$1.8 million - via the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers built at the request of the Little Calif. The corps of engineers built the breakwater met commission.

Maybe the state will think this project is important enough to kick out the extra \$2% million," Hannon told the port authority, "If? the state doesn't, it'll have to write a check to the corps of engineers for \$1.8 million."

PORTAGE - Christmas came early in the form of \$500,000 for officials hoping to start construction on a public marina this spring.

The State Budget Agency Thursday released a portion of a 1989 appropriation to the Lake Michigan Marina Development Commission for marina work. Local officials expected the money to be released as early as August, but were never officially put on state Budget Agency agendas when funding allocations were discussed.

Portage Mayor Sammie Maletta said Sens. Bill Alexa, D-Valparaiso, and Michael Gery,

D-West Lafayette, assisted in getting the money released. Gery is on the state Budget Agency.

"We still have \$276,000 that is our share from 1989 yet," Maletta said.

He doesn't know when the remaining money will be released.

"I think it's understandable because of the state budget crunch. We didn't really question that, we're just tickled pink they released the money they did," Maletta said.

The LMMDC sought \$776,000 from the state for marina development. As Portage officials continue plans for the public

marina, they will submit claims to the LMMDC, which will pay them out of the stateappropriated money.

About \$390,000 will be used to raise a low bridge over Burns Waterway, Maletta said. The National Steel Midwest Division bridge currently keeps boats longer than 40 feet from using the waterway. Bids for the project were let earlier this year, but without the state funding, no contract was awarded.

"With this money, we're going to have to rebid the cost of raising the bridge. The bids came in higher than we anticipated,"

Maletta said.

City Engineer John Hannon will prepare bid specifications for the bridge-raising project, which is expected to take 90 working days. Work can be completed if even weater conditions are unfavorable, according to the mayor.

The remaining money will be used for infrastructure improvements and marina construction.

Portage is locked into a joint venture with the Little Calumet River Basin Commission to construct the public marina. The LCRBC agreed to build the

marina in the early 1980s when the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers constructed a breakwater at the mouth of Burns Waterway.

The joint venture states the city and LCRBC will split the construction cost. It also states once operation and maintenance costs are covered and revenue bonds used to fund construction are paid, the city will keep any extra money. Portage will operate and staff the marina.

Hannon told City Council members earlier this month the marina will cost about \$7 million. The funding can be divided into \$3.5 million in state matching

funds - \$1.5 million from the city through Tax Increment Financing funds; \$1.5 million from the LCRBC; and \$500,000 from the Department of Natural Resources. He hopes to receive another \$1.5 million from the LMMDC

That leaves a \$2 million shortfall, which means the project could be broken up into phases.

The actual size of the marina will be determined by a feasiblity study being conducted by Ab-omnarche Inc. of Benton Harbor, Mich. It will vary between 250 and 300 slips. LCRBC members awarded the contract to Abonmarche Dec. 5 for a price of
